### Greetings, FCC Family!

It's fall, y'all! The weather is cooling down and, before you know it, the holiday season will be here. During the holidays its easy to let your busy schedule be thrown into overdrive with shopping, family get-togethers, parties and time-honored traditions. A season that's meant to be a time of reflection, gifts and thanksgiving can turn into a neverending blitz of things to do. Things you meant to do (some that you need to do) get pushed to the backburner.

Then, at the beginning of the year, most will take a breath for a moment and shortly after consider what they would change for the new year. (I know this sounds premature but 2024 is only 3 months away!)

With that in mind, let me share with you something that is indispensable to me; reading the Bible. Let me explain. We've had a dedicated group of 6-7 that have been reading 6 chapters of the Bible a week and meeting every Wednesday night for two years straight. On September 19th we passed the halfway point of completing the entire Bible. It's been slow but, as the saying goes, "slow and steady wins the race."

I've tried on multiple occasions to read the entire Bible in a year and failed. Reading 5-7 chapters a day is daunting enough, but imagine if you miss a day or two and have to catch up. It can be demoralizing as chapters pile up fast. It quickly becomes a chore. Our Bible Discussion group is on a (nearly) 4-year plan to complete the Bible. When you read 5-7 chapters a day, it's like trying to take in the scenery while driving 70mph on the highway. You see a few things but most of it is a blur. Since we are reading and discussing 6 chapters a week, it's like seeing that scenery

while walking on a path. You can see everything. You can stop, examine things you've never noticed before and walk away with more much information and inspiration than you had before.

We've had longtime, octogenarian members of our church that have said, "I've never learned this much about the Bible before." Comments like that make it all worth it. We're about to start the book of Isaiah and would love to have more people join in the reading and discussion with us. We walk away not only with a better understanding of God's word, not only a closer relationship with each other, but also a closer walk with the Lord. If there's anything I would suggest for you, start now or for 2024. Join us in reading the Bible slowly. Our reading schedule is posted on fccec.org or can be found on our lobby table. It's the best investment into yourself that you can make.

### SEPTEMBER 2023 BOARD REPORT

The official board met in the Fellowship Classroom on Sept. 11, 2023, at 7:00 P.M. Teresa Moore, Moderator, called the meeting to order and opened with prayer. Our pastor and 20 board members were present. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved. The list of committee chairpersons agreeing to serve in 2024, as well as a ballot for the proposed board officers were distributed.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Portia Copeland provided the August check register as well as account balances.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE: The Worship Committee met on Sept. 10th with nine members present as well as the pastor. With the help of our office administrator, Rana White, there will be a brochure for Homecoming that will give a short history, points about what Disciples of Christ profess as well as other interesting facts. There are also plans to celebrate our longest living and newest members. New initiatives will be celebrated as well as any events that have occurred from October '22 to October '23. In addition to Homecoming, the liturgical calendar was discussed as the seasons of the year are fast approaching.

The last piece of the agenda came from the pastor who is concerned about our people not singing or engaging in the service. It was the consensus of the committee that if Rev. Long participated as best he could, it would help demonstrate the importance of singing in worship. Our music program, comprised of volunteers, does a good job of helping to lead in worship, and we encourage others to join them.

Rev. Long feels that we are not doing enough to inspire members to immerse themselves into the service and that he has received reports that our service appears "dead." Although the pastor usually follows the lectionary as in many other Disciples congregations (a collection of scriptural readings from the Bible that follow the church year), at other times he has preached using other formats.

Committee members were encouraged to decide if they will choose to remain on their committees for next year and encouraged to talk with the chairperson about any needs that they see at this time. The next meeting is on Oct. 8th.



**UNFINISHED BUSINESS:** Tammy Sawyer led the ad-hoc committee's report of the Constitution and By-Laws revisions. The board members followed as the committee led us page by page through the suggested revisions. The finished copy will be brought to the Oct. board meeting for approval.

MINISTER'S REPORT: Rev. T.J. Long, Jr. made nine visits in August to members of our congregation.

Open Gym was closed for the month of August but will start back on Sept. 18th.

We began watching season three of The Chosen with an attendance of six but anticipate more in the coming weeks.

Our Bible Discussion group is currently reading through the books of 2 Kings and 2 Chronicles. We will start Jonah and Isaiah soon. On the 19th of this month, we will have read half of the Bible!

We completed our Annual School Supply Drive on Aug. 6th. We raised a total of \$1171! We had 12 people help with the packing party. With those funds we were able to donate 25 filled backpacks complete with all needed school supplies plus cups, stirrers, k-cups and hot chocolate for the teacher's lounge at Pasquotank Elementary School. - 1. I've been asked to serve on the Vision Committee for the Albemarle District where we will plan our 300th meeting next month in Washington,
- 2. I'm serving on the Local Arrangements Committee for the Regional Assembly that will take place at Barton College on Oct. 14th. We meet every Thursday and I have my own technology subcommittee that I lead.
- 3. Assist in implementing some of the changes to the worship service that the Worship Committee has agreed to as we approach Homecoming,
- 4. Help with the onboarding and paperwork that will be reguired from our new Children's Ministry Intern.
