

Happy Advent Season, FCC Family!

This month we will make the figurative journey to Bethlehem to celebrate the birth of Christ. Hear the thoughts of Rev. David Yarborough. "We know the story well, yet we should remain humbled and amazed at the birth of our Savior. He was literally born in a barn and laid in a manger. Why? The Lord could have made reservations in the finest of hotels, but instead Jesus received a welcome into the world with, 'Sorry but there is no room in the Inn.'

God wasn't caught off guard. He orchestrated it all. For the child would be named Jesus which means 'the Lord saves' - for he would save his people from sin. The Lord arranged this to happen during a census which sent Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem – where the prophecies declared the Savior would be born.

So why such a modest entry into the world? There are several lessons to learn. In his birth, Jesus embraced poverty. Instead of being born with pomp and circumstance, he chose to be an outcast. He was not given a warm bed inside a palace. His head was laid in a feeding trough. Jesus became poor so that we could become rich. The Apostle Paul said, "For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich" (2 Corinthians 7:8-9). Jesus Christ stepped out of the riches of heaven and humbled himself as a man. He didn't become a king, but became poor so that we might receive the riches of God's mercy and grace.

Jesus also embraced humility. God allowed his son to be born in the humblest of circumstances; a dirty stable. The Lord announced the birth of his Son to a group of smelly shepherds in a field. For the most part, the birth of Jesus was a quiet event. Other than the Magi, few came to celebrate him. Yet, God took those humble beginnings to change the world. God uses the humble things of the world to shame the wise (1 Corinthians 1:27).

Jesus is attracted to humble things – humble places and humble hearts. God rejects the proud, but gives grace to the humble. He looks for humble hearts that will acknowledge their need of forgiveness. Many, however, will reject or ignore him, leaving no room for Jesus in their lives. God longs for us to receive the Son of God to

his rightful place as the King of our hearts.

Don't shut the door of you heart and declare there is no room for Him. Remember the hymn: 'Let every heart prepare him room...' Make room. Open your heart and make room for the Lord Jesus." Receive the poor and humble as He does. Indeed, we would be good to become humble ourselves.

I pray that word blesses you as it did me.

NOVEMBER 2023 BOARD REPORT

The Official Board of First Christian Church met in the Fellowship Classroom on Nov. 6, 2023, at 7:00 P.M. Teresa Moore, moderator, called the meeting to order and opened with prayer. Roll call by the secretary indicated that 16 board members and our pastor were present. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Portia Copeland provided the October check register as well as account balances as of October 30th. Of special note was the large check written for Wind & Hail Insurance (\$15,714) for the year. However, our church has been informed that next year that cost will be much lower while the coverage of damages will remain the same.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE: The Worship Committee met on Oct. 8. The following items were discussed:

- We will return to the organ for music except the choir anthem.
- All Saints Day will be recognized on Nov. 5.
- Veteran's Day (11/11) will be recognized on Nov. 12.
- Thanksgiving Sunday will be on Nov. 19.
- Decoration of the church on Dec. 1, at 6:00 P.M.
- First Sunday of Advent (12/3) HOPE; 2nd Sunday (12/10) PEACE; 3rd Sunday (12/17) JOY; 4th Sunday- Christmas Eve (12/24) LOVE.
- One service on Christmas Eve beginning at 10:30 A.M. preceded at 10:00 A.M. by coffee and donuts in the Fellowship Hall with assistance by membership committee.
- Christmas Eve service will include the pastor presenting the Christmas story (including carols, anthems) and the children of the church presenting a play.
- Baby dedications on Nov. 5 and Nov. 19.
- Discussed the reinstatement of the greeting moments (passing of the peace) near the beginning of worship each Sunday as all agreed it adds a spirit of fellowship.

Melodi Robbins has reached out to SOULS but has not yet heard back from the leader. Our pastor reported that his prison ministry training has been pushed back several months so he has not had the opportunity to ask them. Since there is no hurry, we will wait to hear back from these possibilities.

MINISTER'S REPORT: This minister's report covers things accomplished in the month of October. I made 11 pastoral visits this past month.

Open Gym averaged 13 teens in attendance each Monday night. We concluded watching season three of The Chosen, where we averaged 10 in attendance. That same group wanted to watch "The Sound of Freedom," which we will be showing here at the church for free on Nov. 14 at 6pm. Our Bible Discussion group is currently reading through the books of 2 Kings, 2 Chronicles, Isaiah, Micah and Hosea.

I volunteered as the Technology Subcommittee chair for part two of the 175th Regional Assembly on the campus of Barton College. We had 150 in attendance and were delighted to have the General President Terri Hord Owens present. Her message at the end of the assembly was inspiring. I wish everyone from our church could've heard her speak.

I attended the initial meeting for the Pasquotank Minister's Council for Education on the 24th and spent time with Principal Simona White from Pasquotank Elementary School talking about the needs her and her staff have for the school year. I will share those needs when I receive them via email.

The Blue Card training I was slated to attend to volunteer with the Pasquotank County Chapter of Kairos was post-poned last month and will occur in February.

I completed our Administrative Assistant's (Rana White) sixmonth performance review, which has been reviewed by Gene Scott, Stewardship Committee Chair.

Here are my goals for November:

- Assist the Worship and Education committees in securing help from the children and congregation for the Advent Season as well as having another baby dedication on the 19th of this month
- Focus on visitation with the goal of visiting 12 or more.
- Continue with the search for a part-time Children's minister/ intern.

I'm open to all feedback and I greatly appreciate all that you all do in service to First Christian Church!
